#### FOURTH QUARTER RESULTS

Council's fourth quarter achievements were presented at the August council meeting. Some highlights from the Quarter - 1 April to 30 June 2023 included:

- A narrow section of hilly terrain along Brungle Road was widened and upgraded to improve driver safety.
- A section of the Tumut Riverwalk was widened to enable better accessibility for walkers, cyclists and mobility vehicles.
- 90% of the safety improvement works on Brindabella Road between the Goodradigbee River and Piccadilly Circus were completed.
- 60 tonnes of burnt fencing material was collected under the NDE Environment Protection Authority's FenceCycle Program.
- 20 residential DAs, 34 CCs, and 117 Planning Certificates were processed through our development and planning department.
- Over 1,200 residents used their waste vouchers helping us to sort and reduce waste to landfill.



Heavy Patching on Batlow & Tumbarumba Roads was also undertaken during quarter four.

# ROTARY PIONEER PARK UPGRADES CONTINUE

Upgrade works at Rotary Pioneer Park in Tumut have progressed following the installation of the new amenities building.

Walking paths from the amenities building to the carparks have now been constructed and connection works to commission the amenities building are underway.

Other works completed to date include the inclusion of nature play spaces, concrete edging around the playground areas, the rework of walking paths, installation of two new pedestrian bridges, new timber platform seating, bollards around the Elm Drive carpark, and clean-up of the banks around the pond.

Works still to come include solar lighting along the Riverwalk from Pioneer through Bila Park to the entrance of Riverglade Caravan Park, installation of new play equipment, and a new pedestrian bridge between the two Elm Drive carparks, as well as carpark sealing.
