COUNCILLOR COLUMN – DEPUTY MAYOR HUGH PACKARD



Almost 20 years ago I stood aside from Council after having served two terms as a Councillor with the then Tumut Shire Council. Returning in 2024 as the Deputy Mayor of SVC it is interesting to observe how much has changed, and also how much has stayed the same.

The most obvious and significant change is the current issue of a potential de-merger. 20 years ago the issue was how to successfully merge Tumut

Council with the Brindabella part of the broken up Yarralumla Council. The Brindabella road was a challenge then, and it remains a challenge today, although incrementally it has improved and will continue to improve.

Another significant change in the district, are the massive improvements in IT, connectivity, and communications in general. Being a rural, rugged local government area no longer means being a poor cousin in terms of connectivity. As Councillors for example, we no longer receive printed Business Papers, but access everything we need through our iPad, Councillor Portal, and the cloud, anywhere, anytime.

Rate Pegging was around and causing financial difficulties for Council during my past terms, and it should be no surprise that after two more decades of constricting Council's ability to pay for the services it provides, Rate Pegging is causing even more difficulties. Cost shifting from the State Government combined with the compounding effect of many years of Rate Pegging is seeing SVC and many other Councils applying for Special Rate Variations to remain viable and to sustain services, something that was far less common 20 years ago.

I am looking forward to my time on Council and am honoured to have also been voted to be Deputy Mayor to work alongside Mayor Julia Ham.

CHILEAN NEEDLE GRASS CONTROL ALERT

Over the coming weeks, our work crews will be spraying for Chilean Needle Grass in parks and nature strips.

Known for its invasiveness tendencies, the potential for spread, and economic and environmental impacts the grass



is becoming a serious pasture and environmental weed forming dense stands in pastures, bushland and roadsides.

MAYOR MEETS WITH MINISTER FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Mayor Julia Ham met with the NSW Minister for Local Government Minister, Ron Hoenig, MP, and Dr Joe McGirr MP, last Thursday to discuss the ongoing deamalgamation process.



Council is on track to provide its Financial Sustainability Plan and Dealmalgamation Implementation Plan to the Boundaries Commission before the end of this year.

Minister Hoenig told Cr Ham he had great faith in the Boundaries Commission and would support their recommendations which are expected to be presented around April 2025.

Should the Boundaries Commission support the de-amalgamation, a constitutional referendum would need to occur where 51% of all voters in the Snowy Valleys will need to vote yes in support.

The referendum could cost up to \$130,000 and the Minister advised he would consider a loan to Council to cover this cost.

The Minister also indicated he would consider a \$5 million grant to Council, as per legislation, in support of the de-amalgamation process if it was approved to go ahead.
