LEVEL 1 WATER RESTRICTIONS

From Thursday, 8 May, Level 1 water restrictions apply across the Snowy Valleys region due to worsening drought conditions.

While our water supply is still sufficient, early action helps ensure long-term availability.

Under Level 1 water restrictions, you can:

- ✓ Water gardens anytime with a handheld hose & trigger nozzle or a bucket
- ✓ Clean hard surfaces like driveways with a handheld hose & trigger nozzle
- ✓ Use sprinklers only between 5pm–10am
- ✓ Wash cars on grass with a trigger nozzle or at a commercial car wash

Restrictions apply to all residential, commercial, and industrial properties.

While water supplies remain sufficient for now, taking early action is essential to protect the long-term supply.

NATIONAL ROAD SAFETY WEEK

To mark National Road Safety Week, we've teamed up with Transport for NSW to install bright yellow "Look out for trucks" stickers at busy pedestrian crossings in Adelong, Batlow and Tumbarumba.

The stickers remind pedestrians and cyclists of the extra risks posed by heavy vehicles and that trucks have blind spots, wide turns, and longer stopping distances, so it's important to take extra care when crossing in high-traffic areas.



Simple but effective, these kerbside safety prompts help everyone stay more alert and safer.

National Road Safety Week runs from 9 to 15 May 2025 and aims to raise awareness about the impacts and importance of road safety in NSW and reduce the number of serious injuries and fatalities on our roads.

Community members are encouraged to 'take the pledge' to drive safely so others survive and wear a yellow ribbon to demonstrate commitment to road safety.

WEBBS BRIDGE – WALTEELA ROAD

In November 2022 floods swept through the region, impacting roads and infrastructure. Webbs Bridge on Walteela Road was one such structure destroyed by floodwaters.



Now, with the flood waters long gone, the Mannus community has a brand-new bridge in place.

The rebuild is nearly complete, with only the sealing of the approaches left to do, which is scheduled for the coming weeks.



The replacement project was funded through the Commonwealth and NSW governments' Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.
