10.11 LATE REPORT - ROADS EXPENDITURE REPORT 2023/2024

REPORT AUTHOR: MANAGER TECHNICAL SERVICES

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Quarterly Budget Review as of 31 March 2024 was reported to Council at the May Ordinary Council Meeting.

It was recommended that the Budget be varied in accordance with the report; Council received and adopted the report as presented. A further resolution was included to receive a report on the budget overspends and associated remedial actions. The roads over expenditure disclosed within the Quarterly Budget Review document was for material and services only and did not take into consideration other expenditure items under the control of the budget holder.

It is recommended that the Roads and Expenditure Report 2023/2024 be noted and accepted.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT COUNCIL:

- 1. Note the "Roads Expenditure Report 2023/2024" on the Budget expenditure and associated remedial actions.
- 2. Fund from untied revenue the estimated over expenditure on local roads as at 30 June 2024 of \$300,000.

BACKGROUND:

At Council's Ordinary Meeting dated 16 May 2024, Item 10.4 Quarterly Budget Review as of 31 March 2024, Council resolved to '*Receive a further report on the budget overspends and associated remedial actions.*

The budgets for Roads were adjusted in the March Quarterly Budget Review to reflect actual expenditure for Materials and Services only. Urban Roads increased by \$210K, Rural Local Roads (RLR) Sealed increased by \$370K and Regional Roads increased by \$300K. Employee costs, internal plant and gravel had not been adjusted within the budget review process at this time. When taking these costs into account the over expenditure on local roads reduces from \$880K to an estimated \$300K as at 30 June 2024.

REPORT:

An analysis of expenditure under the control of the Budget holder has been undertaken and compared to the Budget over the last three financial years for both Local Roads and Regional Roads. The analysis has been reproduced below for Councillor's information.

As identified, actual expenditure for 2023/2024 for Local Roads is comparable to the previous two years. The original comparative budgets, however, for Local Roads - Urban, Sealed and Unsealed for 2023/2024 is significantly less (28.4%) than the Budget allowances for the 2021/2022 Financial Year. In fact, the total local roads comparative budget in 2021/2022 was \$2,293,619 whereas the actual expenditure in 2023/2024 to 2 June was \$1,917,289. Nevertheless, it is anticipated that Local Roads expenditure will be \$300,000 over the allocated budget by 30 June 2024.

The Local Roads Budgets in 2024/2025 have been increased to ensure Council can continue to maintain the road network in an adequate condition.

The Regional Roads maintenance expenditure under the control of the Budget holder, which is only \$29,697 over budget as 12 June 2024, can be offset by a reduction in Capital Expenditure on Regional Roads.

Under Council's adopted Road Management Plan, 451km of local unsealed roads, 445km of sealed local roads, 138km of urban roads and 167km of regional roads are maintained.

Council receives, on average, 500 Customer Requests (CRMs) per year. This equates to about 10 per week that require investigation and response to the community.

In addition to the allocated budget, Council has received over \$3.2M worth of work, on top of the previously reported \$7.2M in November 2023, focused on road asset repair under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) since 2020. This funding is focused on the restoration of Essential Public Assets (EPA) to pre-disaster levels, however, includes a small component of capital works for items including culvert replacements and pavement replacements.

Council received \$410,037.47 from the NSW State Government in the 2022/2023 financial year. This funding was allocated to address the degradation of the network due to impacts of continued wet weather over an 18-month period, however it was used within the first 8 months of receiving the funding.

The Road Maintenance Agreement has continued to be used in line with the approved area of impact on Tooma Road and Elliott Way.

Management is continuing to implement improved financial controls to improve budget compliance.

FINANCIAL AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS:

The over expenditure on Local Roads will need to be funded from untied revenue, however, total expenditure on Regional Roads (Maintenance and Capital) can be managed within the Block Grant received from Transport for NSW.

A portion of the Block Grant initially intended to fund works on the Alpine Way, has been transferred to the maintenance budgets, with this project approved and funded from Regional Emergency Road Repair Fund (RERRF). This will enable further maintenance works to be undertaken on the Regional Road Network prior to 30 June 2024.
