

## Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009 - Section 6(5) Record - as of 1 July 2025

Under section 6(5) of the *Government Information (Public Access) Act* 2009 (GIPA Act), Snowy Valleys Council is required to maintain a record of open access information that it does not make publicly available on the basis of an <u>overriding public interest against disclosure</u>.

Open access information is information that must be made publically available. It includes Council's <u>policies</u>, <u>guidelines</u> and the <u>disclosure</u> <u>log of access applications</u>.

The following table sets out the records of open access where Council has determined to redact information on the basis of an overriding public interest against disclosure.

Snowy Valleys Council was formed by proclamation on 16 May 2016. Records prior to this time have not been considered in this record.
